Recycling Committee Minutes - January 29th, 2015

There was a **Recycling Committee Meeting** held on the date noted above @ **ecomaine**. The meeting was called to order by Erik Street, Chairman.

Item #1: - Minutes:

Ed Suslovic made a motion to accept the minutes as written. Richard Brobst seconded the motion, and approved unanimously.

Item #2: - ecomaine Grant Program 2015:

Leo Maheu reported that the grants for FY 15 have been awarded. Reports are pending for the following:

- Bonny Eagle Middle School
- MECA
- The Hall School in Portland

Leo Maheu also reported on FY 14 grants and the following school projects are incomplete and pending final reports:

- Deering High
- Lyseth
- Riverton Elementary

Committee member Ed Suslovic plans to assist us with follow up with those schools.

Item #3: Communication and Outreach:

Leo Maheu reported on the number of individuals **ecomaine** reached via tours, events, presentations and other outreach activities since the last Recycling Committee meeting.

Frank Gallagher reported on the recent analytics as they relate to **ecomaine.org** and reported on the earned media generated by this year's Education Grant program.

Item #4: - eco-Excellence Awards

Erik Street reported that the 2015 eco-Excellence Judges Committee met today and had completed its work. Frank Gallagher reported that **ecomaine** received 21 nominations for the eco-Excellence Awards this year. Nominations received are up from the 16 received last year. The committee awarded 14 eco-Excellence Awards.

The 2015 eco-Excellence Awards event will be held on Tuesday, March 3, from 11:30 am to 1 pm.

Item #5: - Recycling updates

Kevin Roche reported on legislation pertaining to municipal solid waste policy introduced in Augusta during the current session, calling attention to the following:

- LD 105 CDD Exemption
- Virtual Net Metering (PERC Proposal)
- LD 273 Treat WTE as a Class 1 Renewable (Previously LD 425)
- Bottle Bill Moving the Bottle Bill to DEP and moving large bottles in the Bottle Bill over to Municipality recycling programs.

The committee had a lengthy discussion on these bills particularly those associated with the bottle bill. There was a difference of opinion expressed from the committee and staff. It was recommended that it be brought before the Executive Committee on 2/10/2015 for further discussion.

Mr. Roche also reported on current recycling market conditions and community recycling rates.

Motion to adjourn was made by Richard Brobst, seconded by Sarah Bernier, and approved unanimously.


