ecomaine Recycling Committee Workshop Minutes April 27, 2011

<u>Committee Members present</u>: Dick Brobst, Len Van Gaasbeek, Troy Moon, Susan McGinty, Travis Wagner, Bonnie Rodden, and Sarah Bernier

ecomaine Staff present: Kevin Roche, Shelley Dunn, and Missi Labbe

Agenda Items:

1. Review of 03/23/11 meeting minutes

A motion to accept the minutes was made by Mr. Brobst and seconded by Mr. Van Gaasbeek. The minutes were approved unanimously.

2. Silver Bullet Painting Contest

Ms. Labbe explained that three of the entries felt the project was doable. Silver bullet will be primed and delivered to the school's as soon as weather permits. Prior to commencement of the projects, ecomaine will be asking each school to indemnify ecomaine should any mishaps occur.

3. Catalog Choice Update

Mr. Roche explained that the full Board had approved the budget to include the money needed for one year subscription to Catalog Choice. Ms. Labbe indicated that ecomaine had requested the draft agreement be sent for consideration in preparation for the July 1, 2011, anticipated start date. Ms. Wojcoski indicated that the agreement should stipulate that there is no automatic renewal and the agreement was for only one year's subscription. Ms. Labbe stated that staff would review the agreement carefully to ensure it met ecomaine's requirements.

4. Laura Reading, USM Student, Service Learning Project Review

Laura Reading a USM Student working with Professor Travis Wagner, presented a service learning project in which she looked at the efficiencies of creating silver bullet consolidation points to serve locations in outlying areas. The project plotted potential locations for consolidation under two scenarios which provided for 5 consolidation points and a second scenario that provided for 3 consolidation points. The outcome projected a savings of as much as \$2,800 in overall transportation costs. This study did not take into consideration the capital costs necessary to facilitate a consolidation point and did not look at viability of potential sites used in the study. Mr. Roche indicated that several towns have moved to utilizing compactors instead of silver bullets and the potential for savings on hauling when doing so. The committee discussed the information at length.

5. Discussion on Email Statements

Ms. Labbe explained that ecomaine has offered to begin sending statements via email instead of a printed paper statement. The suggestion was sent out in a letter to all ecomaine customers and also as a note on current statements. The Accounting Department has reported a limited response to the offer. Staff is asking the members of the Recycling Committee to encourage their respective towns to give this option a try. Towns opting in can change their minds and return to printed statements at any time if they should decide email statements do not work well for them. If towns utilize this option it would not only save on postage but would also reduce waste paper. Staff received feedback from the Committee and will work with towns to go paperless.

6. Legislative Update on Product Stewardship Bills

Mr. Moon updated the Committee on the status of bills currently in front of the Legislature. Currently there is a bill being discussed to include small businesses/small quantity generators in the ewaste laws allowing them to dispose of ewaste for free as residents currently do. ecomaine will be testifying in favor of this bill. Mr. Roche will be testifying neither for nor against a bill that would remove 28oz glass bottles from the bottle bill. Another bill up for consideration addresses medical sharps. Ms. Bernier indicated that sharps are a problem in the two communities she serves, Saco and Scarborough. Mr. Moon indicated the same is true for Portland. There are several bills aimed at changing the bottle bill in one way or another. Mr. Roche testified that he would like to see the inefficiencies of the bottle bill addressed. He indicated that ecomaine will be hosting a debate regarding the bottle bill on June 17th here at ecomaine. More details will be forthcoming.

7. Recycling Updates

Mr. Roche updated the Committee on current conditions of the recycling commodities markets and material movement.

Dear Tony:

I would like to congratulate Falmouth for deciding to adopt weekly curbside collection of recyclables. This will be a great enhancement of your town's recycling program and a great convenience to your residents. The ecomaine recycling committee has heard, however, that the Town Council may also eliminate or reduce the number of silver bullet recycling containers available to the public. I wanted to reach out to you and share some information that I hope you and your colleagues will consider as you deliberate on this topic.

The ecomaine Recycling Committee has reviewed the recycling programs of our member communities and has found that towns utilizing both curbside and drop off collection have more effective recycling programs than those that rely on curbside collection alone.

For example:

- Pownal instituted curbside recycling in 2009. When they eliminated their silver bullets very soon after, their recycling tonnage fell from an average of 14.86 tons to 11.93 tons. This represents a 20% reduction.
- North Yarmouth moved to curbside recycling in 2008 and eliminated silver bullet use in 2010. They saw a reduction from an average of 45.45 tons of recycling to 38.19 tons when silver bullets were removed from service. This represents an 18% reduction in recycling.

 Old Orchard Beach added silver bullets to its already existing curbside collection service and saw an increase from an average of 30 tons per month to 47.04 tons. That is an increase of 57%.

Drop off containers such as the silver bullets make recycling accessible to many people who may not be fully served by the curbside program. These include residents of apartment buildings and condominiums, small businesses and residents who may miss their collection day or who generate a large quantity of recyclables between collections.

The Town of Falmouth has been a leader in waste reduction and recycling since the early 1990s. It was the first town in the region to institute a pay-as-you-throw program – an approach to waste reduction since adopted by several neighboring communities. Even before beginning curbside recycling, Falmouth residents recycled at impressive rate. The ecomaine Recycling Committee commends these achievements.


We hope you will strongly consider the information we have shared with your and decide to maintain your silver bullet program in its current form.
