SUBJECT: Outreach & Recycling Committee Minutes – November 8, 2018

The **ecomaine** Outreach & Recycling Committee met November 8. The meeting was called to order at 4:05 p.m. by Caleb Hemphill, Chairman.

- 1. Approval of Minutes
 - Maxine Beecher moved to approve minutes, Rob Wood seconded and all unanimously approved.
- 2. Open House Survey Review & Follow Up
 - Matt provided an overview of the survey that followed the 2018 Open House, as well as feedback from Board and staff, which has been generally very positive.
- 3. School Recycling Grants Program
 - The Committee adjudicated 13 proposals, and awarded grants to each of the applicants (though in some cases, not awarding the full request). The Committee awarded \$20,750 in total. The grantees are:
 - i. Chelsea Elementary School, \$450 for field trip to ecomaine and reusable coffee pods for teachers
 - ii. Hollis Elementary School, \$1,118 for a variety of materials for recycling and composting
 - iii. Waldo County Technical Center (Liberty), \$500 for recycling bins and a field trip to ecomaine
 - iv. Deering High School (Portland), \$1,500 for recycling bins and ecomaine stickers
 - v. Portland High School, \$4,000 to replace paper towel dispensers with efficient hand dryers
 - vi. Carl J. Lamb Elementary School (Sanford), \$980 for recycling bins, ecomaine education/field trip, and materials for the school's Recycling Team
 - vii. Scarborough High School, \$1,600 to replace paper towel dispensers with efficient hand dryers
 - viii. Shapleigh Memorial School, \$1,175 for ecomaine field trip, zero waste table construction, recycling bins & transportation, materials
 - ix. Boys & Girls Club of Southern Maine (South Portland), \$1,530 for composting program
 - x. Roots & Fruits Pre-School (South Portland), \$850 for vermiculture materials and information

- xi. Vinalhaven School, \$3,150 for various recycling supplies bins, custodial trucks, transportation.
- xii. Waterboro Elementary, \$1,700 for sustainability-themed field trips, including to ecomaine, food waste reduction, and materials, including a new zero waste table
- xiii. Thomas College (Waterville), \$2,191 for various sizes of recycling bins for dormitories and other buildings, support for student attendance at Green Campus Coalition meetings.
- 4. eco-Excellence Awards
 - Matt gave an overview of the timeline for the 2019 eco-Excellence Awards, including dates for announcements and Awards ceremony, and encouraged Committee members to nominate and share in their communities.
- 5. Outreach & Education
 - Matt provided a brief overview of ecomaine's educational outreach and media reach since September. FY19's numbers continue to track ahead of FY18's.
- 6. Recycling Market Report
 - Tabled
- 7. No other/new business was presented.

B2. Metrics, Nov. - Dec. 2018

Recyclopedia:

- Downloads to date stand at 2,976 (an increase of 169 in Nov-Dec).
- A total of 112,400 items have been searched on the RECYCLOPEDIA (up from 87,325 at end/October).
- The widget on web pages has been viewed 50,394 times (up from 33,307 in October).
- The top 10 searches are: plastic bag, Styrofoam, milk cartons, plastic straws, plastic bottle caps, aluminum foil, almond milk cartons, plastic utensils, hangers, and alkaline batteries.
- We held a January 15 webinar for communities interested in embedding the widget on their sites there were eight attendees from around the state.

Social Media Stats:

- Facebook:
 - Gained **49 new followers** in Nov-Dec (2,218 in total).
 - Our top organic post in December was on the 7th, reaching 2,379 users (a posting of the recent *60 Minutes* piece on recycling).
 - November's top organic post was on November 7, reaching an impressive 14,348 users (post-election info on disposing of political signs). We also reached more than 3,000 with a Thanksgiving infographic.
 - Average daily organic post reach was 700 users.
- **Twitter:** We gained 16 new followers in Nov-Dec, for a total of 697, and we earned 28,100 tweet impressions in November and 17,600 in December, with the top tweet (1,430 impressions) being our tweet about recycling and the on-court promotion at the December 6 Red Claws game.)
- **Instagram:** We had 85 Instagram posts in Nov-Dec, which generated 1,972 likes. We gained 108 new followers for a total of 789. This is a quickly-growing platform for ecomaine, yielding good returns.

ecomaine.org:

- Web traffic was level from October to December; we are up 68% compared to this time last year.
- **Page views** increased 5% from October to November and 5% again from November to December; we are at 13,431, up more than 73% from December 2017's 7,758 page views.
- **Bounce Rate** ticked down *very* slightly in December, but time spent interacting with our page is up overall and steady, still.
- It is notable that our holiday recycling/waste tips page was the fifth-most visited page in December.

B4. Update on School Recycling Grants, FY19:

Each of the schools has agreed to the funding provided by the Committee, and have returned countersigned grant agreements, resulting in the first payments of 80% of the grant total.

In cases where schools received grant funding for an ecomaine field trip, we are encouraging them to make their plans <u>before facility renovations begin</u>.

- **Chelsea Elementary School**, for a recycling field trip and reusable coffee pods for teachers \$450
- Hollis Elementary School, for a variety of materials for recycling and composting \$1,118
- Waldo County Technical Center (Liberty), for recycling bins and a recycling field trip \$500
- **Deering High School** (Portland), for recycling bins and ecomaine stickers \$1,500 (plus ecomaine stickers)
- **Portland High School**, for replacing paper towel dispensers with efficient hand dryers \$4,000
- **Carl J. Lamb Elementary School** (Sanford), for recycling bins, recycling education and field trip, and materials for the school's Recycling Team \$980
- Scarborough High School, for replacing paper towel dispensers with efficient hand dryers \$1,600
- **Shapleigh Memorial School**, for recycling field trip, zero waste table construction, recycling bins & transportation, materials \$1,175
- Boys & Girls Club of Southern Maine (South Portland), for a composting program \$1,530
- **Roots & Fruits Pre-School** (South Portland), for vermiculture composting materials and information \$850
- Vinalhaven School, for various recycling supplies bins, custodial trucks, transportation. \$3,150
- Waterboro Elementary, for sustainability-themed field trips, food waste reduction, and materials, including a new zero waste table \$1,700
- **Thomas College** (Waterville), for various sizes of recycling bins for dormitories and other buildings, support for student attendance at Green Campus Coalition meetings \$2,191
